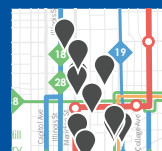

We are pleased to share with you IndyGo Foundation's first Annual Report. In our short history, we have substantially increased access to transportation in Marion County. Such an impact is only possible with your philanthropy. Thank you.

At its essence, IndyGo Foundation seeks to give as many riders as possible equitable and safe access to the IndyGo transit system. 2022 was a year filled with many highlights.

- We increased nonprofit engagement within our programs from 63 organizations in 2021 to 130 in 2022.
- We received two significant grants from the City of Indianapolis Department of Public Works and the IU Health Community Impact Investment Fund to improve pedestrian safety and accessibility to bus stops.
- Our revenue increased 225%, reaching \$1.4 million in less than three years of fundraising.

Driven by our mission, the Foundation is uniquely positioned to create rapid change toward greater transportation access and equity. By working in step with IndyGo, community, and business leaders, the Foundation acts as a force multiplier, convening partners and leveraging private investment in public infrastructure.

- African American Woman

- There is no vehicle available to her.
- She uses cash on the bus and walks less than 1/4 mile to and from the bus stop.
- She only takes one bus to arrive at her destination
- She uses the bus 5 days a week to travel between home and work.

When we talk about access to transit we are referring to:

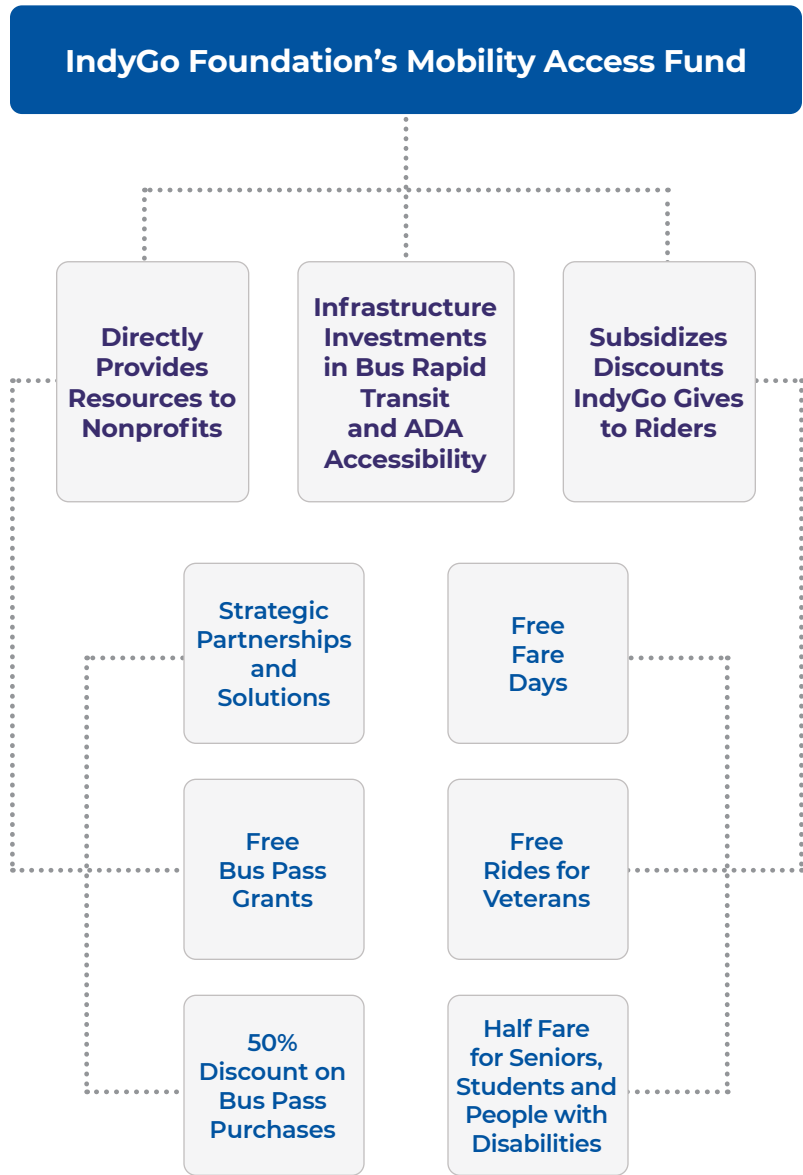
PHYSICAL ACCESS

Riders need well-maintained ramps and sidewalks that create safe and secure connections to and from transit stops.

ECONOMIC ACCESS

Riders need to be able to afford to get to their destination, regardless of income level.

IndyGo Foundation Awards Bus Pass Grants to Local Nonprofits

On January 10, 2023, the IndyGo Foundation, with support from the PNC Foundation, awarded more than 27,000 bus passes to 79 local nonprofit organizations to increase accessibility to public transportation for Marion County residents. The free passes will assist vulnerable residents through the IndyGo Foundation's Mobility Access Fund to decrease financial barriers to their access to public transportation and assist them in seeking employment, food, healthcare, and other essential services.

“Bus passes are one of the greatest needs of nonprofit organizations and the easiest way to provide clients with immediate assistance,” said IndyGo Foundation Executive Director Emily Meaux. “The bus pass grants have become a hallmark of the IndyGo Foundation, and we are thrilled to expand the program this year to serve more in our community.”

“At RecycleForce we see transportation’s daily struggle on many of our participants. Most are just being released from incarceration and do not have a support system. Upon release, they are hitting the ground running to secure housing and employment and catch up on fees already piling up. Many are rarely released with any sort of ID, let alone a driver’s license. This bus pass grant has ensured that one less worry is on the shoulders of our participants.”

“The Library saw more patrons requiring 31-day passes, with 79% being issued to job seekers who received a pass upon hire as

a resource to help them during their first month on the job. Generally, the top three one-day pass distributions were 35% for job seekers, 22% for housing initiatives such as transportation to shelter, and 17% for low-income households to meet basic daily needs such as transportation to a grocery store, a doctor’s appointment and/or a simple ride home.

Bus passes have been distributed at Central Library, East Washington Street, Martindale-Brightwood, East 38th Street, West Indianapolis, Spades Park, Nora, Irvington, Haughville, Glendale, Eagle, College Avenue, Beech Grove, and Garfield Park Branches.

To improve healthier living in Indianapolis, the Library is pleased to bridge the employment, housing, and health sectors to ensure those in need have stability.”

“Sherry had been experiencing homelessness since 2020. Because of living outside and her lack of access to medical care, Sherry struggled with severe arthritis that affected her mobility. While at the Julia M. Carson Transit Center, she saw Gennesaret’s Mobile Medical Clinic. Rather than having to navigate to a clinic site, Sherry received care right then and there, including receiving a bus pass generously provided to her by the IndyGo Foundation. Jyoti Zaveri, our physician assistant (PA), was able to treat Sherry but also recognized she needed more care than just anti-inflammatory medication to manage her overall health. Sherry was referred to our Health Recovery Home, where she is accessing resources and taking steps to secure permanent housing of her own.”

Honor and Memorial Gifts

Greg and Libby Quinn Hahn made a gift to the IndyGo Foundation to remember and honor the lives of their grandfathers, Acel F. Hahn and John J. Quinn, who both retired from the Indianapolis Public Transportation Corporation in the 1900s.

A Memorial contribution provides an opportunity to honor the memory of a loved one with a monetary gift in their name. An Honor contribution uniquely recognizes an individual for a noteworthy accomplishment or special occasion. The gift made by the Hahn's accomplishes both.

About 1901, Acel F. Hahn (grandfather of Greg Hahn) moved to Indianapolis with his wife Nellie Van Fleet Hahn as young newlyweds and started a job with the *Indianapolis Transit Authority* as a conductor and fare collector. It was one of the leading transit systems in the United States and was made up of trolleys on rails pulled by horses and mules. The couple moved into the near east side of Indianapolis. Acel worked for the Transit Authority until 1921 when he retired and moved his family to eastern Indiana and then to Ohio, where he farmed until his death in 1949.

John J. Quinn (grandfather of Libby Hahn)

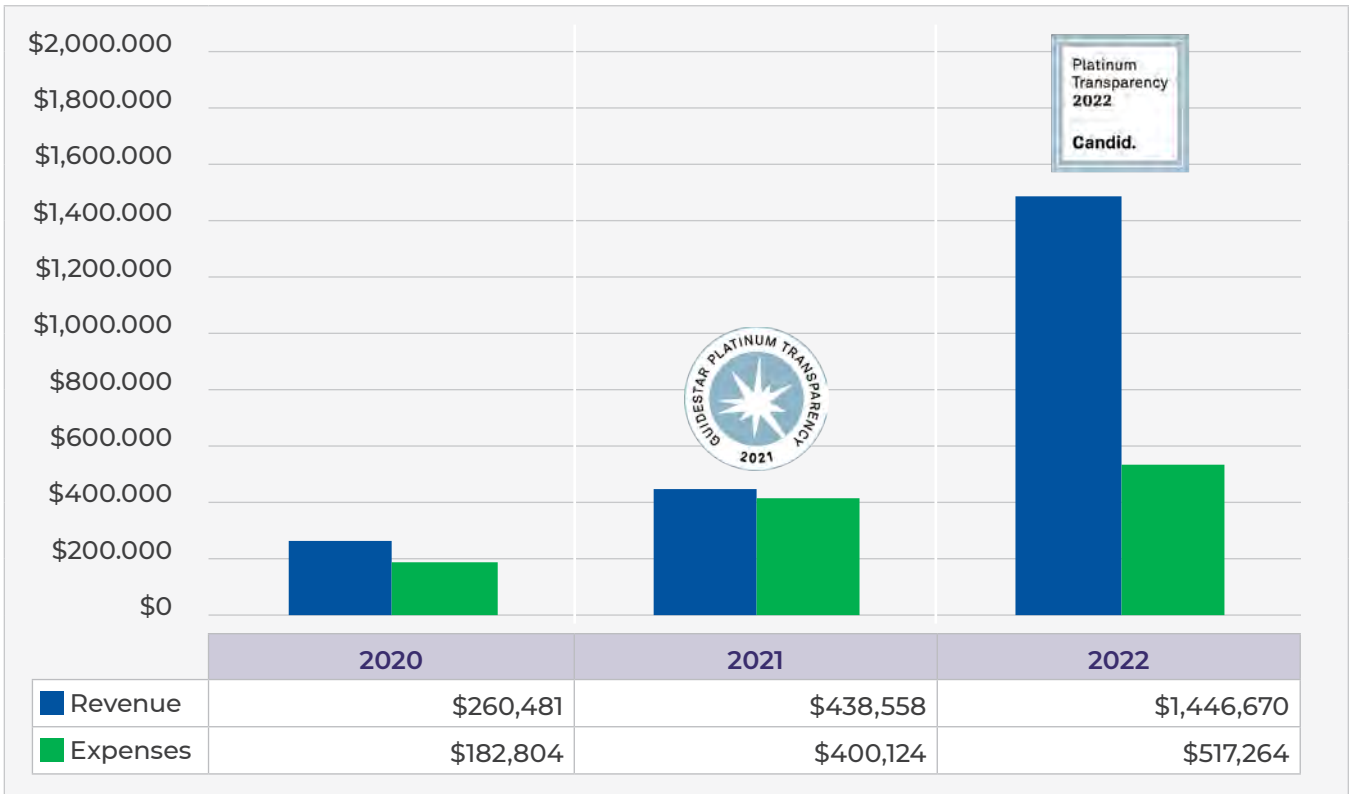
immigrated from Galway, Ireland, in 1904. He made his way to Boston and worked there until he moved to Indianapolis. His wife Margaret also migrated from the Galway area at a different time and came straight to Indianapolis. They met and were married in 1914 and moved to the near Eastside of Indianapolis. John also went to work at the *Indianapolis Transit Authority*, working in the "roundhouse," which was located at the corner of Eastern Avenue and Washington Street. He worked there for 36 years and then retired.

Acel and John likely walked to work together for several years, and the families knew each other quite well since they lived five houses apart.

Greg and Libby Quinn Hahn are very proud of their family's ties to the *Indianapolis Transit Authority* and want to continue their grandfathers' great service and legacy by supporting the work of the IndyGo Foundation.
